He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering from Penn State University and entered the U.S. Air Force following graduation in 1961 as a member of the USAF Surgeon General's Facilities Division. Doug, from PA, met Sue, from Lanett, AL, in the summer of 1962 at England AFB, LA, and they were married on Thanksgiving Day of 1962. His military career took him from Louisiana to Florida, Vietnam, California, Texas, Washington, DC, and back to Texas. He retired in 1981 from active duty as a Lt.
