City of Austin Utilities offers Services for Medically Vulnerable Residents

If anyone in your household is a City of Austin Utilities customer and has a medical condition that could become life-threatening during a power outage, you may qualify for the Medically Vulnerable Registry. Though customers on the registry are not guaranteed uninterrupted power or priority restoration during an emergency, they will be eligible work with a designated team member to establish a personalized emergency backup plan.

Texas Legislature Grapples with Growing Interest in Alkaline Hydrolysis

Here in Texas, and across the nation, people are expressing a growing interest in human composting and alkaline hydrolysis as alternatives to conventional body burial and "fire" cremation.

Human Composting, also called "natural organic reduction," involves placing a body in a reusable vessel with biodegradable materials that foster the transformation of the remains into nutrient-dense soil that can be returned to loved ones or donated to conservation land.

Human compositing is currently legal in Washington, Colorado, Oregon, Vermont, California and New York.

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Alkaline Hydrolysis has gained approval in well more than a dozen states and is now under consideration in Texas. Two bills – SB105 and HB 2895 – have been filed for consideration by the 88th Texas Legislature.

Although Alkaline Hydrolysis bills submitted to the House during the 86th and 87th legislative sessions died in committee, the current companion bills indicate that the desire to have this disposition option available in Texas is far from dead.

What is Alkaline Hydrolysis?

The process begins by placing a container with human remains in an airtight, leak-proof chamber, typically shaped like a cylinder. The chamber is then filled with a customized mixture of water and potassium hydroxide, and heated to a temperature above 300 degrees. The pressure in the chamber is elevated to prevent boiling. During the process, the remains are rotated and vibrated.

A body of average size and weight is reduced to sterile chemical components in four to six hours. Larger, heavier bodies may take up to thirteen hours.

Other terms for Alkaline Hydrolysis:

- Aquamation
- Resomation
- Flameless Cremation
- Water Cremation

Since 2005, Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN, has used alkaline hydrolysis as their disposition method.

Alkaline Hydrolysis was also the disposition method of choice for Archbishop Desmond Tutu, who died on December 26, 2021.

Alkaline Hydrolysis chambers, also called **Resomators**.

Arizona grandmother's M&M-themed funeral casket goes viral

Mary Stocks Martin of Snowflake, Arizona, was buried in a casket she built and modeled after the blue M&M

A grandmother in Arizona made sure her funeral would reflect her colorful and fun personality with an M&M-shaped casket.

Mary Stocks Martin, a retired teacher from Snowflake, Arizona, died on Feb. 9, at the age of 86, according to her <u>obituary published</u> by the Silver Creek Mortuary, a local funeral home and cremation provider.

Her funeral was held at the LDS Love Lake Chapel in Taylor, Arizona, on Feb. 18, where guests were able to see Martin's unique casket during the wake and graveside service.

Billy Martin, one of Martin's grandsons, told FOX 10 Phoenix that Martin worked as a schoolteacher for 30 years.

"She used to initial everything 'MSM,' but that 'S,' in cursive of course, looks like M&M," he said. "The students started bringing her M&Ms, memorabilia and it just turned into something that she reflected on as part of her success as a teacher."

Martin reportedly built her M&M-shaped casket, with help from her son, years before her death.

The Martin family said the casket was modeled after one of Martin's favorite M&M spokecandies – the blue almond M&M which has been aptly named "Blue" by Mars, Inc.

Blue was introduced as an M&M spokescandy in 1995. He has an ellipsoid-shaped body due to his almond core and has been branded as having a calm and cool personality, according to advertising materials.

Martin's casket captured the essence of Blue, which featured the close-eyed M&M while his hands held miniature candles that had the names of Martin's children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren etched onto each.

Snippets of the M&M-themed funeral were shared in a video slideshow that was <u>uploaded to TikTok</u> by Martin's grandson, Scott Roundtree, on Feb. 19.

The video has been viewed more than 9.2 million times and has received more than 1.4 million likes.

Voluntarily stopping eating and drinking

Our FCA members continue to express an interest in VSED, Voluntarily Stopping Eating and Drinking, a legal alternative to Medical Aid in Dying, which is not an approved option in Texas. This lightly-edited article by Martha McClellan, provides some basic information about VSED.

Sometimes conversations with other elders are about how we want our deaths to be. We want them gentle, peaceful, surrounded by loved ones (or not). Many friends of mine have died recently. One had a beautiful and loving end surrounded by family. Another, a sudden heart attack at home with no warning. One, in a hospital with a long, drawn out, excruciating yet courageous, few weeks. Another, from taking his own life – he was ready.

We have accidents, illnesses and our bodies just wear out.

A 2018 Stanford University School of Medicine study found that 80% of us prefer to die at home. However, about three-quarters of older Americans die in nursing homes or hospitals. Leading causes of death for people over age 65 are: 1) heart disease, 2) cancer, and 3) lower respiratory disease. We can see that the hospital scenario is obvious for many of us.

Another choice we have has recently come to my attention. If we get to a place that is unacceptable to us as far as pain, quality of life issues and never-ending suffering, there is something called Voluntarily Stopping Eating and Drinking – VSED. It is a way to end suffering in a fairly gentle, peaceful and predictable way. Animals sometimes wander off and die this way.

This choice has been used by terminally ill people throughout modern history. Many on the verge of death come naturally to this process – they no longer want to eat, although they do desire water. One of my friends died recently in this manner and it was all just so instinctive and spontaneous.

I've just read "The VSED Handbook," by Kate Christie. Her mother had early onset Alzheimer's and was determined not to end up in a memory care facility. They worked together while she was still lucid, along with others in her family, a care team headed by a death doula, a doctor and a lawyer to enable her to go through this process smoothly, and avoid the horrors of late-stage Alzheimer's.

This book offers an actionable plan emphasizing the importance of planning, palliative care and a network of support. It is a fascinating account of how one person stayed out of a memory care center. Christie also describes what to expect from each stage of the VSED process, and the highlights and challenges, and unexpected gifts of accompanying her dying mother on her final journey.

Some acquaintances have mentioned wanting "something in the closet" in case they need it eventually, depending on how their later years go. VSED seems to be it. While Medical Aid in Dying is the law in Colorado if you have a six-month fatal diagnosis, VSED is not authorized by state statue or by court ruling. But that doesn't mean it's illegal.

VSED is legal nationwide. The U.S. Supreme Court, in Cruzan v. Missouri, 1990, said a "competent person would have the right to refuse lifesaving hydration and nutrition." VSED is legal for a person nearing the end of life who has the mental capacity to make their own medical decisions.

It may be more difficult for people who are not terminally ill to receive health care support through the VSED process. However, Hospice assures me that they would support someone midway through the dying process or if they are comatose, with a doctor's order. They have always been on the compassionate side of the dying and have assisted with many cases similar to this.
